Like many quilters she started sewing in junior high, and by high school was making her own clothes. She began making quilts in the 70's and started taking classes in the 80's. By the 90's Sandy states that, "I was obsessed with all things quilting. *Sandy's Designs* was founded in 2002 when I started creating patterns. I've been teaching classes since 2004 at various quilt stores. In 2016 I became a "Quilt In A Day" Certified Teacher."

Sandy lives in Laguna Hills, CA. "Beach Cities Quilters Guild has been an important part of my quilting life. I've been a member for 23 years. In 2010 I was the quilt show chair for, "FantaSea of Quilts", and I co-chaired the 2016 quilt show. I also served as the 20th President of "Beach Cities Quilters guild". My other passion is competitive slalom waterskiing. I have competed at the Regional's (13 western states) many times and the National's in 2015. It brings me great joy to share my experiences and all that I've learned with others who share my passion for quilting."

I can't believe another fiscal year has begun for the Glendale Quilt Guild. Thank you all for your confidence in allowing me to be your President for the next year. I am happy to serve in this capacity and look forward to working with the new Board that will be serving with me. Some of you may not know how I got interested in quilting. My mom started quilting when she took an Eleanor Burns workshop on the Oregon coast sometime in the 1980's. She started making quilts for her eight children, and grandchildren, and the rest is family history!

Eleanor Burns gets the credit for creating a quilting revolution in my family for sure. Before the internet, and YouTube tutorials, Pinterest, Etsy, and endless ways to purchase fabric, patterns, and online demonstrations on how to make them, Eleanor wrote very easy to follow instructions and when I started quilting I studied them. I learned many of the quilting basics from Eleanor Burns, Harriet Hargrave, and other authors.

In 1992 I decided that my job as a humble civil servant didn't allow much creativity in my life, so I purchased my first machine from a vacuum and sewing machine store on Brand Blvd. It was a Riccar and cost me \$99.00. I made a trip to Quilt N Things to purchase fabric, and I was off and running. I made my first log cabin quilt, quilted it myself, added binding (very poorly), and looked to see what I could make next. Radiant Stars and Bargello quilts followed, and then evolved into other patterns to explore, and I have been feeding my addiction ever since. I make all kinds of quilts, and have tipped my toe into many different techniques. I thank the guild workshops for offering me the chance to know what I like and, importantly, what kinds of piecing and quilting just aren't for me.

I joined the guild in 2012 and became newsletter editor the same July. I have served on the Board in different capacities since then, and have enjoyed all of the different jobs, but most importantly I have enjoyed learning about the people in the guild and developing relationships with you.

I want to express my sincere gratitude to Colleen Shier for her leadership of the guild during the tumultuous time of relocating to a new facility and for her undying optimism. Colleen has been extremely sharing of her knowledge and set a good example for me to follow, as I start my tenure as president. Thank you Colleen!

I also want to acknowledge the board members, past and present, which I have had the opportunity to work with for this guild. Without the members who are willing to step up to the plate to get the jobs done, both large and small, this guild would not be successful in our mission.



OH MY STARS! - July 2018 -

COMBINATION STAR



Cutting Directions: All blocks this year use a $\frac{1}{4}$ inch seam allowance and will be the same size: $12\frac{1}{2} \times 12\frac{1}{2}$ unfinished.

From fabric provided with pattern:

C Fabric: Cut two (2) $5\frac{1}{4}$ " squares, cut each twice on the diagonal for 8 pieces



From coordinating fabric:

A Fabric: Cut five (5) $3\frac{3}{8}$ " squares (corner & center squares)

From background or coordinating fabric:

B Fabric: Cut ten (10) $2\frac{7}{8}$ " squares, cut each once on the diagonal for 20 pieces

D Fabric: Cut two (2) $5\frac{1}{4}$ " squares, cut each twice on the diagonal for 8 pieces



Sewing Directions: (refer to diagram on upper left)

- Sew four "B" pieces to each side of the five "A" pieces (corner & center squares)
- Sew two "C" to two "D" pieces, being careful to follow the diagram. Then sew together to form a new square piece. Repeat for 4 squares
- Sew two "A/B" squares to each side of two "C/D" squares to form the top and bottom rows (again, being careful of placement - follow the diagram)
- Sew two "C/D" squares to each side of the center "A/B" square to form the center row
- Sew 3 rows together as noted in the diagram

MINUTES OF THE GLENDALE QUILT GUILD EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING JUNE 7, 2018

I. The **meeting** was called to order by President Shier at 6:30 p.m. at the Glendale Women's Athletic Club and a quorum was present. Present: Colleen Shier, President; Sharon Bishop, Recording Secretary; Mernie Meier, Communications Secretary; Kathy Fogel, Treasurer; Leanne Compean, Parliamentarian; Cindy Abrams and An Burgess, Programs; Susan Edwards, Workshops; Karen Millman and Pat Golditch, Membership; Kathi Wilson, Fund Raising 2018; Rasa Read, Fund Raising 2019; Elke Miyahara, Newsletter; and Tina Curran, Loving Hands. Also present were incoming Board Members Crystal Dudley, Beth Hasenauer, Mary Jamora, Alice Smith, and Nancy Turney.

II. The **minutes** of the previous meeting were approved as printed in the Newsletter.

III. BOARD AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

President/Shier: The President's annual report was highlighted. Copies will be sent to Board Members. A list of eligible voters was read along with an outline of strict procedures for approving the 2018-2019 Budget. Reminder to turn over procedure books.

Vice President/Shier: The June meeting we will be hosting the Big Bear Quilt Guild with two Opportunity Quilts. We will be holding a sale of our Library Books at \$1 each. Leftover books will be donated to Goodwill. We will also be selling \$1 bags of scraps. The next SCCQG meeting is July 14 in Santa Barbara and the topic is Leadership. Board members are encouraged to attend.

Treasurer/Fogel: The May Treasurer's report was presented. Please turn in all receipts and requests for reimbursement no later than the end of June so that the current year's books can be closed. A final annual budget report will be given next month. The proposed 2018-2019 budget was presented. A **motion** was made to approve the proposed 2018-2019 budget. The motion was seconded. Along with a list of possible actions that could reduce our yearly deficit spending going forward, a letter was read from Tim Spinn, outgoing Vice President and incoming President urging the Board to approve the proposed budget. The board voted unanimously to accept the proposed budget.

Communications Secretary/Meier: Jean Giacomelli's mother has begun hospice care. Melinda Helscher's father passed away and Martin Stuart, former member and husband of member Barbara Stuart passed away suddenly. Joanne Brown lost her sister. Maria Rodriguez is recovering from surgery for a pinched nerve. Congratulations to Colleen who just found out she will be a grandmother.

Parliamentarian/Compean: The incoming officers will be installed at the next meeting and begin serving July 1.

Programs/Abrams: The June meeting will be a Pot Luck and members are encouraged to bring finger foods that lend themselves to an easy cleanup.

Workshops/Edwards: Signups for upcoming workshops are looking good.

Membership/Millman: Attendance at meetings is holding steady with an increase in visitors as well as returning members. Renewals are looking good and program suggestions made on membership forms are being included in the newsletter.

Newsletter/Miyahara: In order to simplify the mailing of newsletters, Elke will try placing the newsletter in pre-addressed envelope. The cost of postage is the same.

Fund Raising 2018/Wilson: The opportunity quilt made \$444 at the Montrose Arts and Crafts Festival bringing the total so far to \$4932. Quilt 'n' Things will be displaying the quilt and selling tickets. The quilt will also be at the Glendale Cruise Night Car Show in July. So far 98 tickets have been sold for the Under the Big Top event which is almost half of capacity. If sales continue this way we won't need to spend money on advertising. The next meeting is June 13 at noon at WAC and the next workshop is scheduled for June 27 at WAC.

Fund Raising 2019/Read: Opportunity Quilt ideas are currently being explored along with what kind of fund raising event to have.

Loving Hands/Curran: Currently of the 30 camper quilts we pledged to deliver, we have 33 for sure with a possibility of others coming in prior to scheduled delivery at the June meeting. The next Loving Hands day is June 15. We will begin collecting orphan blocks to be used for quilts. We received more fabric from Candy's. Sharon passed around a card for Candy thanking her for her ongoing generosity and inviting her and a companion to be our guests at the Under the Big Top event in October. Cindy announced a free workshop for June 16 that will focus on making red, white and blue quilts for Quilts of Valor.

Equipment/Inventory/Shier: Work is underway to reduce the amount of stuff in storage with a goal of moving to a smaller storage unit as a means of saving money.

IV. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- The 501(c)3 has been filed and if everything is complete and there are no issues we could hear back in 90 days.

V. NEW BUSINESS

- Calendar changes approved for Loving Hands for 2018 are: October change to October 26, and for December no workshop.
- The Glendale Women's Athletic Club has presented a rental contract for GQG use of their facilities in lieu of our previous monetary donations. An annual charge of \$2,000 covers up to 54 "uses" of the facilities per year. This includes but is not limited to monthly Guild Workshops, monthly Loving Hands days/workshops, monthly Executive Board meetings, fund raising committee meetings and periodic additional workshops. A **motion** was made by Kathy Fogel to accept the contract. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

VI. The meeting **adjourned** at 8:20.

V. BOARD REPORTS

President/Shier: The President's Annual Report is available for anyone wishing a copy.

Vice President/Spinn: The next SCCQG meeting will be a round table discussion on Leadership. Tim welcomed members of the two Big Bear Quilt Guilds who brought their opportunity quilts.

Parliamentarian/Compean: The outgoing Board members were introduced and thanked for their dedication and hard work for the previous year. The incoming Board members were introduced and thanked for agreeing to serve the Guild for the coming term.

Treasurer's Report/Fogel: The May Treasurer's Report was presented along with the recommended budget for 2018-2019. Money will be taken from savings to balance the current year's budget shortfall. After considerable work by the Budget Committee the new budget reflects the need to curtail spending and increase income.

Panguitch, Utah Quilt Walk Festival

I drove through Panguitch, Utah on scenic highway 12 on my recent trip to Bryce Canyon. There were quilts displayed along the road in this beautiful, old, town. The quilts hung in the bright sunlight. They were tied into tubes and hung over the hitching posts along the street. Some were faded to pastel colors by the sun; others were bright and new looking. I didn't have time to stop and investigate due to travel plans, but I determined to find out about this charming sight upon my return home. What was it all about? I had stumbled across the Panguitch Quilt Festival which coincided with my trip through town. Here is the story of the Panguitch Quilt Walk.

The first group of pioneers came to Panguitch, Utah on March 16, 1864, from Parowan under the leadership of Jens Nielson. They followed the route over the rugged Bear Valley, a part of the Spanish Trail. Crops were planted, but the season was short and they did not mature. The winter of 1864 was extremely cold and the snow was deep. The closest supplies were either in Gunnison, 115 miles to the North, or Parowan, 40 miles to the west over the difficult Bear Valley Road.

Seven men, Alexander Matheson, William Talbot, Thomas Richards, Jesse Lowder, John Butler,

Thomas Adair, and John Paul Smith left Panguitch to go to Parowan to get flour and food for the starving colony. They had two yoke of oxen and a light wagon which they had to abandon at the head of Bear Valley because of the deep snow; they then proceeded on foot. The only progress that could be made over this frozen, crusted snow was to lay a quilt down, walk to the end of it, lay down another, and walk again. By relaying the quilts in that way they reached Parowan.

Alexander Matheson recorded in his journal, "We decided that if we had faith as big as a mustard seed, we could make it and bring flour to our starving families. So we began the quilt-laying in prayerful earnestness. The return trip was harder with the weight of the flour, but we finally made it to our wagon and oxen and on home with thankfulness to the Lord of His goodness. The whole settlement welcomed us, because we had been gone longer than expected. There had been prayers, tears, and fears which turned to rejoicing and cheers."

You never know what quilting stories and adventures you might encounter along the scenic byways of America! If you have an interesting story about quilting from your travels, please share them with the newsletter editor.
